#### Sermon

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**1 Corinthians 15.20-28 /** Last Sun A / Nov 22, 2020

# Grace, Mercy and Peace to you from God our Father and our soon to return Lord, Jesus Christ!

In Psalm 8, King David sings these beautiful words to God:

"When I look at your heavens, the work of your fingers, the moon and the stars, which you have set in place,

what is man that you are mindful of him,

and the son of man that you care for him?

Yet you have made him a little lower than the heavenly beings and crowned him with glory and honor.

You have given him dominion over the works of your hands; you have put all things under his feet" (Ps 8.3-6).

St Paul is quoting this psalm in verse 27 where he writes: "God has put all things in subjection, under His feet" (v 27). Paul applies these prophetic words to Christ, but when David wrote them, he was

thinking of mankind in general. David is referring to the order of God's creation in Genesis 1: "Then God said, "Let us make man in our image, after our likeness. And let them have dominion ... over all the earth" (Gen 1.26).

When God created the universe and His people, declaring them to be 'very good', it was God's intention that all creation would be in subjection to Adam. Everything. God's original design is for Adam to be the ruler of all the universe, *under God*. This is the ideal. This is the work God created Adam to do. And he did, for a while. You all know the story, on a particular day Adam chose a new 'god', his own selfish desires. Today we call it 'sin'.

And now, because of Adam's choice, mankind no longer rules over all things, instead, we are ruled by *death*. "Because of one man's trespass" Paul writes to the church in Rome, "death reigned through

that one man" (Rom 5.17). Paul repeats himself this morning in his letter to the Corinthians, "by a man came death ... in Adam all die" (v 21-22).

This is a profound truth. Sin, by definition, is the choice to be ruled by death rather than God. Adam knew, 'that in the day [he] should eat of the fruit of the garden ... he would surely die' (cf Gen 2.17). Likewise, you and I have known since confirmation that "the wages of sin is death" (Rom 6.23), and yet we continue to sin anyway!

I can't imagine how awful Adam must have felt. Like a father waking up from a hangover to the realization his drunk driving accident killed his family. Adam wakes up to the fact that *all* his children, grand children, great grandchildren and all their kids too will all die a horrible death and their blood is on his hands! "Because of one man's trespass" the Scriptures tell us, because of Adam, "all die."

This morning, brothers and sisters in Christ, we are all of us, under the rule of our last enemy, *death* (cf v 26).

This is very bad news indeed. In fact, for all of chapter 15 Paul is working hard to comfort the Corinthian Christians as they contemplate the horrible, inescapable, reality that even Christians die. Some in the church are so upset they have begun to lose faith.

Beloved of the Lord, it is precisely when our hopelessness is the darkest, that the hope of the Gospel shines the brightest! "But we do not want you to be uninformed, brothers, about those who are asleep," the apostle tells us, "that you may not grieve as others do who have no hope. For since we believe that Jesus died and rose again, even so, through Jesus, God will bring with him those who have fallen asleep" (1 Thess 4.13).

Even though you and I are believers in Jesus Christ, we nevertheless have every reason to grieve and be sad when death separates us from the ones we love. Death is the 'last enemy'. But even though you and I have every reason to cry and be sad, because of Christ, we have even more reason to hope!

St Paul leads his frightened, grieving congregation back to the basics, the very foundation of the Gospel: "Now I would remind you, brothers, of the gospel I preached to you, which you received, in which you stand ... For I delivered to you as of first importance what I also received: that Christ died for our sins in accordance with the Scriptures, that he was buried, that he was raised on the third day in accordance with the Scriptures" (v 1-4).

The reason this is so important, Paul explains, is because "if Christ has not been raised, your faith is futile and you are still in your sins.

Then those also who have fallen asleep in Christ have perished. If in this life only we have hoped in Christ, we are of all people most to be pitied" (v 17-19).

Everything rises or falls with the Gospel truth that Jesus Christ died for our sins, was buried, and on the third day rose again. "But in fact Christ has been raised from the dead!" Paul comforts his church, "[He is] the firstfruits of those who have fallen asleep . . . . For as in Adam all die, so also in Christ shall all be made alive" (v 20-22).

Paul identifies Jesus as the firstfruits of all who will one day be raised to new life together with Him. You and I, beloved of the Lord, are the *second harvest*. All baptized believers in Jesus Christ who have had their sins washed clean by Jesus' blood shed from the cross will be 'made alive' in Christ! "But each in his own order" Paul explains, "Christ the firstfruits, then at his coming those who belong to Christ.

Then comes the end, when he delivers the kingdom to God the Father after destroying every rule and every authority and power. For he must reign until he has put all his enemies under his feet. The last enemy to be destroyed is death" (v 23-26).

This morning, you and I are <u>living in the end times</u>. Sin and death reigned from Adam to Moses. The law and it's wages of death ruled until the time of Christ. In the Gospels, Jesus identifies His earthly ministry as the beginning of God's merciful rule of grace. "The Kingdom of heaven is at hand" (Mt 4.17), Jesus announces with every sermon, every healing, each absolution.

This is exactly why the Jesus' second coming at the end of the world is such a joy for the Christian. You and I should be praying, expectantly hoping and looking for His coming every day of our lives!

When Jesus came the first time, He began His great work of undoing

the world's curse of death that was brought on by sin. He demonstrated the power of God's Kingdom by preaching the Gospel of repentance, forgiving sins, healing and raising from the dead. Each ministry event is a victory for God and a defeat for the enemy.

"The last enemy to be destroyed" the Scriptures teach, "is death" (v 26).

When Jesus comes again at the end of time the victory of the reign of the Kingdom of God will be complete. God's perfect order of creation shall be restored as all things are once again in subjection to Christ. His enemies will lie defeated, crushed beneath His feet (cf Gen 3.15!) and death itself will die.

On that great day, which can't come soon enough, you who are 'in Christ' (v 23), you who believe Jesus died and rose again, for you, "the Lord Jesus Christ ... will transform [y]our lowly body to be like his

glorious body, by the power that enables him even to subject all things to himself" (Phil 3.20-21). **Amen**.

#### Hymn of the Month


November's hymn of the month is Lutheran Service Book (LSB) #351 – Creator of the Stars of Night. This hymn, existing in manuscripts beginning in the ninth century, was


created for use in monastic life at Advent Vespers, one of the daily services known as the Daily Office, observed in the monasteries. Over the centuries, numerous hymns, known as "Office hymns" were written for various times of the day, seasons, and feast days for use in the Daily Office. The English source in the LSB was based on a translation by John Mason Neale (1818-66), an English Anglican priest, scholar, and hymn writer, and was first published in the *Hymnal Noted* (1851). LSB includes 22 hymns translated by Neale. Two stanzas especially express an Advent theme. Stanza 3 speaks of Christ as the Bridegroom of the Church, the promised virgin's Son to be the sacrifice for the world's sin (Colossians 1:13-17). Stanza 5 identifies His tasks to rule all things until the time of judgment and bring an end to the days of living amidst sin and evil (Revelation 1:7). Since the eleventh century, these Office hymns usually conclude with a doxological stanza, that is, it praises the Holy Trinity – Father, Son and Holy Spirit.

The tune use for this hymn is called CONDITOR ALME SIDERUM and is the traditional chant associated with this text.
