P I am the LORD your God, who brought you up out of the land of Egypt. Open your mouth wide, and I will fill it.





Holy Gospel: Luke 3:1-20

P The Holy Gospel according to St. Luke, the third chapter.



In the fifteenth year of the reign of Tiberius Caesar, Pontius Pilate being governor of Judea, and Herod being tetrarch of Galilee, and his brother Philip tetrarch of the region of Ituraea and Trachonitis, and Lysanias tetrarch of Abilene, during the high priesthood of Annas and Caiaphas, the word of God came to John the son of Zechariah in the wilderness. And he went into all the region around the Jordan, proclaiming a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins. As it is written in the book of the words of Isaiah the prophet,

"The voice of one crying in the wilderness:

'Prepare the way of the Lord,
make his paths straight.

Every valley shall be filled,
and every mountain and hill shall be made low,
and the crooked shall become straight,

and the rough places shall become level ways, and all flesh shall see the salvation of God."

He said therefore to the crowds that came out to be baptized by him, "You brood of vipers! Who warned you to flee from the wrath to come? Bear fruits in keeping with repentance. And do not begin to say to yourselves, 'We have Abraham as our father.' For I tell you, God is able from these stones to raise up children for Abraham. Even now the axe is laid to the root of the trees. Every tree therefore that does not bear good fruit is cut down and thrown into the fire."

And the crowds asked him, "What then shall we do?" And he answered them, "Whoever has two tunics is to share with him who has none, and whoever has food is to do likewise." Tax collectors also came to be baptized and said to him, "Teacher, what shall we do?" And he said to them, "Collect no more than you are authorized to do." Soldiers also asked him, "And we, what shall we do?" And he said to them, "Do not extort money from anyone by threats or by false accusation, and be content with your wages."

As the people were in expectation, and all were questioning in their hearts concerning John, whether he might be the Christ, John answered them all, saying, "I baptize you with water, but he who is mightier than I is coming, the strap of whose sandals I am not worthy to untie. He will baptize you with the Holy Spirit and with fire. His winnowing fork is in his hand, to clear his threshing floor and to gather the wheat into his barn, but the chaff he will burn with unquenchable fire."

So with many other exhortations he preached good news to the people. But Herod the tetrarch, who had been reproved by him for Herodias, his brother's wife, and for all the evil things that Herod had done, added this to them all, that he locked up John in prison.



Service of the Sacrament


Welcome Christian friends! Please respect what we believe, teach and confess regarding the Lord's Supper.



The Words of Our Lord



Hymn of the Month


The hymn of the month for December is Lutheran Service Book (LSB) #373 – See amid the Winter's Snow. The author of this hymn was Edward Caswall (1814-1878), an Anglican priest who converted to Roman Catholicism four years before the hymn was published in a book intended for use in Catholic schools. LSB also includes five hymns that were translated from Latin to English by Caswall. Although the text begins like many western Christmas carols with the romantic notion that Christmas is synonymous with winter and snow, it quickly embraces the rich theology of the nativity. Stanza 1 references Jesus as the gentle Lamb who fulfills God's promise. Stanza 2 connects Christ's lowly birth with His divine power – "throned in height sublime, sits amid the cherubim". Stanza 3 reinforces that concept of the divine Christ Child coming to "such a world as this!". Stanza 4 encourages us to take on His humble likeness in our daily lives.

The tune used for this hymn is HUMILITY, apparently taken from the phrase "in thy sweet humility". It was written by John Goss (1800-1880), who served the Church of England as a musician with quiet distinction. Goss was an organist in various positions, ultimately at St. Paul's Cathedral, London from 1838-1872. He was knighted by Queen Victoria in 1872 and is buried at St. Paul's Cathedral, London.


