Epistle: 1 Timothy 6:6–19

⁶Now there is great gain in godliness with contentment, ⁷for we brought nothing into the world, and we cannot take anything out of the world. ⁸But if we have food and clothing, with these we will be content. ⁹But those who desire to be rich fall into temptation, into a snare, into many senseless and harmful desires that plunge people into ruin and destruction. ¹⁰For the love of money is a root of all kinds of evils. It is through this craving that some have wandered away from the faith and pierced themselves with many pangs.

¹¹But as for you, O man of God, flee these things. Pursue righteousness, godliness, faith, love, steadfastness, gentleness. ¹²Fight the good fight of the faith. Holy Gospel: St. Luke 16:19–31

P The Holy Gospel according to St. Luke, the sixteenth chapter.



¹⁹[Jesus said:] "There was a rich man who was clothed in purple and fine linen and who feasted sumptuously every day. ²⁰And at his gate was laid a poor man named Lazarus, covered with sores, ²¹who desired to be fed with what fell from the rich man's table. Moreover, even the dogs came and licked his sores. ²²The poor man died and was carried by the angels to Abraham's side. The rich man also died and was buried, ²³and in Hades, being in torment, he lifted up his eyes and saw Abraham far off and Lazarus at his side. ²⁴And he called out, 'Father Abraham, have mercy on me, and send Lazarus to dip the end of his finger in water and cool my tongue, for I am in anguish in this flame.' ²⁵But Abraham said, 'Child, remember that you in your lifetime received your good things, and Lazarus in like manner bad things; but now he is comforted here, and you are in anguish. ²⁶And besides all this, between us and you a great chasm has been fixed, in order that those who would pass from here to you may not be able, and none may cross from there to us.' ²⁷And he said, 'Then I beg you, father, to send him to my father's house— ²⁸for I have five brothers—so that he may warn them, lest they also come into this place of torment.' ²⁹But Abraham said, 'They have Moses and the Prophets; let them hear them.' ³⁰And he said, 'No, father Abraham, but if someone goes to them from the dead, they will repent.' ³¹He said to him, 'If they do not hear Moses and the Prophets, neither will they be convinced if someone should rise from the dead.'"

Hymn of the Month

Beginning again in September 2022, we will be featuring a hymn each month, which may not be as familiar as other hymns.

For September, the hymn is Lutheran Service Book (LSB) #557 – Seek Where You May to Find a Way. Georg Weissel (1590-1635) wrote this text for his own installation in 1623 as pastor of the new church in Königsberg (now Kaliningrad, Russia). Weissel wrote about 20 hymns in all, including LSB 340-341, *Lift Up Your Heads, Ye Mighty Gates.* The first stanza links the newly built church in Königsberg with the church's purpose – the salvation of God's people. "Seek where you may" to find salvation, but only those who build on Christ as their one foundation will find it. Stanza 2 continues that thought – "Seek where you may" but only Christ, "the God-man and none other" makes us justified through his death. Stanza 3 applies

faith in Christ to life in this world and encourages us to "seek Him first" and He will then "impart his blessings without measure." Stanza 4 shifts from the second to first person, allowing singers to declare their personal certainty with regard to the world to come. "You are my Lord; your precious Word shall guide my way and help me stay forever in your presence".

The tune used for this hymn is SUCH, WER DA WILL, the first line of the text in German. Johann Stobäus (1580-1646) served as cantor of the cathedral school at Kneiphof (an island in the heart of Königsberg) and was appointed Kapellmeister in 1626, where he served until his death. He enjoyed close associations with a number of local poets, including Georg Weissel, and wrote this tune for this text.
