

²Then I saw another angel ascending from the rising of the sun, with the seal of the living God, and he called with a loud voice to the four angels who had been given power to harm earth and sea, ³saying, "Do not harm the earth or the sea or the trees, until we have sealed the servants of our God on their foreheads." ⁴And I heard the number of the sealed, 144,000, sealed from every tribe of the sons of Israel:

⁵12,000 from the tribe of Judah were sealed, 12,000 from the tribe of Reuben, 12,000 from the tribe of Gad, ⁶12,000 from the tribe of Naphtali, 12,000 from the tribe of Manasseh, ⁷12,000 from the tribe of Simeon, 12,000 from the tribe of Levi, 12,000 from the tribe of Issachar, ⁸12,000 from the tribe of Zebulun, 12,000 from the tribe of Joseph, 12,000 from the tribe of Benjamin were sealed.

Hymn of the Month


November's hymn of the month is Lutheran Service Book (LSB) #595 – O Blessed Spring. The text was written by Susan Palo Cherwien (1953-2021), a freelance writer and musician. Her numerous hymn texts appear in denominational hymnals in the United States, Canada, and Europe. The poetic structure of the text traces the four seasons as a metaphor of the baptismal life from baptismal birth to death. The first stanza begins with the "blessed spring", the season of Easter and the "Word and sign" (sign understood in term of

"sacrament" i.e. Baptism). Stanza 2 progresses to youthful summer with all its uncertainties, doubts, and rebellions, nonetheless sustained by Christ's gracious "infusing rain", which is a reference to the daily dying and rising worked by the baptismal Word. Stanza 3 moves to the shorter days of autumn when the heat of youth has cooled but the fruitful harvest of beauty, wisdom, and love is revealed in a seasoned, mature faith. Stanza 4 brings us to the death of winter, when, through faith, we are still able to know the "promise of the spring", namely the Word and sign of Baptism. The final stanza is a song of praise to Christ for the gift of Holy Baptism, the water and the Word that joins us to Christ's tree of life, meaning His death on the cross.

The tune used for this hymn is called O WALY, WALY, an English folksong from an unidentified composer. The name is Scots for "Oh woe! woe!" and is taken from a ballad beginning "O waly, walv, up the bank".
